but at a law school admissions fair i met someone who was from notre dame and she said you know if you're looking in 10:38 chicago you might as well drive the other extra half an hour hour and a half whatever to come up to notre dame and i 10:43 was like yeah okay yeah sure i wasn't really listening to her um but i said 10:49 you know what i'm gonna go for a visit anyway in chicago let's just make the drive up and you guys all know the rest of the 10:55 story because you have your own version of it you get on this campus and something happens 11:00 okay and i had an amazing experience with the admissions office that day some of you 11:05 guys might remember heather moorconey and marie benseman oh my gosh 11:12 i left still planning to go to chicago i was like yeah they're so nice but my spirit stayed on notre dame's campus and 11:18 never left it's still here and that's another reason why this is home you know 11:25 i also want to talk about the importance of home again you know never forget that 11:30 it started with all of us being called here in one way or another we were called to be at this campus at a 11:37 particular time in a particular space to make a particular impact on the people that we met 11:42 some of you are still doing that right now and for those of us that have maybe not been home we still have to do it so i'm charging 11:49 myself with that and i know like so many of my other classmates i stand ready to 11:55 support all of you dean cole included our faculty i am ready to do my part so let's 12:02 remember this is home okay we were called here the second part of being a different 12:07 different kind of lawyer is the path so dean cole shared a wonderful state of 12:13 the law school this morning which i was so just elated to hear about all the new things that you've done 12:19 and you know i think about the time that i graduated and how things were a lot different

it was during so i graduated in 2011. you all might remember the recession between about 2009 and 2011. those were

really rough years in the law the oci was very small there weren't a lot of opportunities i 12:39

felt and um you know i think me and my a lot of my classmates were kind of like this is what this

isn't what we were expecting this is not feeling so hot we're not feeling like these bright 12:50

people that have all these opportunities we were feeling down on the slums and you know many of us took different

12:56

paths as a result of what happened at that time i had offered to go to a regional law firm in dayton ohio but my my heart

13:03

wasn't there um but notre dame had my back notre dame had a bridge to practice 13:08

program i think that's what it's called now back then it didn't have a fancy name i think it was more of a oh crap our students

13:15

can't get jobs the numbers look really bad

13:20

we better figure something out to support them but they had our back so the little stipend we were able to go

13:27

into public interest to go into government and to have the support of the law school that was our paycheck

13:33

because the employers that we went to in those areas are like we can't pay you but you're working for free

13:38

your law school's paying for it cool come on so that's what we did and so i lived with 13:44

three other law students in chicago after graduation niary is in the room

13:50

we were sad y'all like seriously we were like we just graduated

13:57

i thought we were about to make all this money and have all this fame and like did we do something wrong i mean for the grades

14:03

i mean i mean i didn't okay yes i got that c but like was that the reason [Music] 14:08

was it me so much doubt so much doubt some maybe slight depression i'll be honest 14:14

but we made it and within a year we found our way i stayed in government because of that 14:20

and um that changed my life because when you're in government they're kind of like will you do this also you're a

14:26

lawyer that's cool but can you write okay cool you can write can you communicate oh you're a good

14:31

communicator too can you talk to the media can you do this can you do that can you figure out a new policy on this

14:37

or that and you guys know the answer yes we're taught to research and write and defend anything including our own fake

14:44

it till you make it so it opens a ton of doors and so we have different paths so i get to talk a little bit about that

14:51

tonight because i don't have a traditional path because what was not a great time turned into the story of my life

14:58

so the last part that i want to talk about before talking to jasmine the heart of a different kind of a lawyer

15:04

you know that's the common thread it unites us beyond being called on our path 15:09

it's what you find in the heart of the people from notre dame it's what made my spirit stay on this campus when i came

15:15

to visit the heart to make a difference the heart to look after others the heart of empathy 15:22

it connects us the heart of standing up for what matters being a voice to the voiceless even in 15:28

difficult times we all have our own stories of just being that face in the law school 15:34

being someone to just uplift a 1I who's in the library and they just don't get it you know i that was me someone

15:41

that'll come and just be like do you have this outline do you is there anything you need you know do you ever get your

15:47

hair done you know whatever it would be all the people that came back are excellent alumni that were there

that said you're gonna make it do you need help with the job judge ann oh my gosh coming back every year to talk to

15:59

us having an appellate court justice talked to us every year we felt so special and 16:05

so seen and so even though we were the minority at times we always felt seen by our alumni and the faculty who looked

16:12

after us and that is the heart of a different kind of lawyer that is what makes this place special so

16:18

without further ado jasmine come join me let's have a conversation um

16:24

i just while she comes up i quickly you know i can't help but reflect on um the 16:30

confirmation hearings that are happening this past week with judge jackson brown um 16:37

brown jackson sorry um and you know that was some of that was hard

16:42

to watch you know it really was i'll tell this just a short story of when um i was at mcdonald's office

16:50

and it was when she was accepting her nomination initially from president biden i was just walking normally and i

16:55

didn't i wasn't i must have been so busy that i wasn't really following that they were announcing it this day and i stopped in front of the television and i

was just i was frozen and i became emotional seeing what i was seeing her standing between president

biden and a black vice president i was just floored i couldn't believe

17:13

what i was seeing so it doesn't matter what happened this week that happened this is happening we are

17:20

living this history times are changing the world is changing black lawyers black women lawyers we are here to stay

17:27

no matter what hat we're wearing because i'm kind of wearing double hats right now um but i just think we can all have

17:33

so much to learn from her example and i can't help but acknowledge that judge ann was there

to give the closing arguments on her hearing and we're just we're part of that history this is the notre dame law 17:46 school so thank you i look forward to our conversation [Applause] 18:00 all right well thank you so much denisha i'm really looking forward to this conversation and i think we just need to 18:07 give her another round of applause [Applause] 18:16 and are we good to go can you all hear me in the back thank you okay 18:23 all right perfect so i love how you spoke in your speech you talked about 18:28 having your calling having your path and having the heart and i'm so excited about that because i 18:35 have a lot of things that i want to touch on in those three areas you mentioned that you started not wanting 18:41 to go to law school people were telling you to go you're like no it's not really my thing that's my story as well so tell 18:48 us what was the moment that changed your mind that you know this is my calling 18:54 yeah you know i don't know that there was a single moment i would call it more of a collection of moments that we're 19:00 confirming that we all have where you're just like i don't know and you have that little bit of doubt but then something happens 19:06 that confirms it someone says wow really great job on x or wow you really rocked this you know it 19:13 was a lot of moments that happened for me but what i will say is i i feel like 19:19 law gives you like i said it's that foundation that no one can take from you and it has absolutely been what's opened 19:26 every door for me where i've been promoted to positions that i did not deserve honestly i'll just say that i 19:31

mean literally i didn't have the requisite on paper experience but the degree the name notre dame behind it

19:39

has opened those doors where people have taken a chance on me like you know what we believe you can do we're gonna we're

19:44

gonna take a shot on you so honestly that's what confirmed it for me that i had made the right decision i

19:49

love that you said you had some opportunities that you didn't meet the requirements for i think as a black

19:56

woman as a woman in general a lot of times we feel that we see something that we're interested in we see that list of

requirements and we're like oh well i don't have that gpa i don't have those class credits and we take ourselves out

20:09

of the game i love that you took the opportunity and said hey i might not have those requisites but at the end of

20:15

the day if they want me they want me exactly so you had a lot of experiences while you were here at notre dame where

20:22

you led the campus you were sba president you were boss of president so just kind of talk us through your

20:29

experience here at notre dame and what it meant for you to be able to lead in those capacities 20:34

well i can just say it was you know the first year will beat you up a little bit right

20:40

um not going to lie i was feeling a little just

20:46

i made it but i came back to all your kind of disillusioned like

20:51

are we is it going to be more of that or is it going to be different i was just i wasn't sure and uh some of my friends were like

20:58

we're going to london like we're not even taking that risk but i was really planted here i was like i don't want to

21:04

leave may have been that i had a now husband in chicago that i was like i'm not leaving for a whole semester

and you know i had a choice to make i was either going to lean in or i wasn't gonna make it because 21:17 emotionally i was kind of in a one foot in one foot out and you can't do things that way we know better right 21:24 so the minute that i decided to lean in things changed so balsa was there they 21:29 were like hey we need a president it's your turn the three y'alls are like get in line right 21:35 but um also i you know i had to let off some of the emotional 21:42 weight that i was carrying and i remember a key moment at the beginning of 2l year where i went in to 21:47 talk to peter horvath which a lot of you in the room remember peter he was i don't want to mess up his title 21:55 but he was overall like student activities all of the like a little bit of what max 22:00 does today but more broadly and um i just he said how are things going i was in his office talking about 22:07 some balsa stuff just because i had the face on and i started bawling and he was like 22:13 oh he's getting the tissues i'm so sorry what's wrong and i was like i just there was some really negative 22:19 experiences first year i was disinvited from a study group from these girls i don't know why 22:25 they just stopped emailing me and i saw them in the library without me [Music] and i didn't get the outline 22:32 i've just been struggling and i just i feel like i need more support 22:38 and it hurts you know it was the ugly cry and i i was like oh my god i can't believe i 22:43 did that but it lifted such a weight off my shoulders i had been carrying that and it made me not all the way committed 22:51 the minute i let that go i could move forward and i shared it with my family 22:57 my sister was like do you realize that the people that you think are staring at you might not be staring at you because you're different but because they're in

awe of you that you're the only one that looks like you in a room constantly but yet you carry yourself with grace

you show up every day even though you're not in their in crowd or their circle you're there every day

23:15

maybe they admire you and i started to change that narrative in my head i kept showing up and so third year well

23:23

leading into third year all of my friends are in london again so i just got super involved and i was like not thrilled with what

23:29

sba was doing and i was like it feels kind of like insider-ish and not inclusive and you know i'm gonna run

23:35

i had not even been involved any of the two years i had been there i was like i'm gonna run i can change things

23:41

i think we should be more inclusive and i have some ideas and you know what i found after winning is that other people felt the same way

23:48

they felt like it was too insider-ish and exclusive too they wanted more inclusion so 23:54

that's the heart of the notre dame lawyer there are more of us that have that heart black or white than you know

24:01

and those people are the ones that i met because i was kind of forced to go outside of my comfort zone when my friends all went to london

24:07

so that's that's how i led and after that you know i had the support of the faculty because i had built those

24:13

relationships because of dean newton at the time and peter and dwight king and 24:18

so many others who were just there and always had our back you said a lot of really important 24:24

things first you kind of mentioned the story of a moment where you felt like 24:30

you were left out of a study group didn't understand why and you just broke down and i think probably everyone else

24:37

everybody that's been a 1I actually has had a moment where they broke down and i had that experience last semester

24:44 someone said something in class that wasn't didn't sit well with me or really anyone 24:50 else in the classroom i left the class i didn't say anything about it i called 24:55 my mom i'm in my car like crying like i can't believe they said this i don't know what i'm supposed to do with this 25:01 and she told me my mother's a lawyer so she's had this experience and she said you need to find the times 25:07 that you're going to speak up for yourself and you need to really lean in to this experience that vou're having 25:12 because at the end of the day you're at a great school you have a great opportunity so you need to figure out 25:18 where you're going to take those opportunities and run with them and with that it kind of sounded like 25:23 you were dealing with maybe a little bit of imposter syndrome kind of talk about where where else vou 25:29 were seeing that happening within your experience and how you overcame it definitely i mean a lot of the rooms 25:36 that i walk into to this day this just just recently at work i was kind of asked to step in in a bit of an elevated 25:42 uh capacity on our senior leadership team to attend some meetings and i was in a room that was actually 25:48 had some diversity but it was still one of those um sorry intimidating class classroom type 25:55 settings that reminded me of notre dame and i was like okay it's just like nerdy name it's just like north name just 26:00 imagine that you're back in law school you got this you know but it requires acknowledging the moment 26:06 and sometimes it's like they say that you got to take the little you gotta take the cat out of the bag and be like what is it about this experience 26:12

that is making me feel this way and once you acknowledge it and you address it you can deal with it and one of my 26:19 favorite phrases is like do it afraid like sometimes you're you're afraid and you're waiting for the 26:25 fear to disappear and meanwhile you're stuck but like the fear may not leave in time and you 26:31 might miss that opportunity so do it afraid so what keep going so a lot of the times that's 26:38 what i do i'm like i don't know keep going just keep swimming just you 26:43 know and you just keep going and then you look around you're like oh i did that i did that because you're capable 26:49 right we were trained excellently the way we think i mean you made it you belong here you heard that 26:55 from jackie and other speakers this weekend you know you're in the room because you're qualified 27:01 that's a prerequisite you're already in the room so stop you know having that conversation but we all do it and so i 27:06 think it's okay to realize that you're doing it just keep going anyway i think that's really important how 27:13 you are in the room because you deserve to be there we've had some conversations throughout the weekend how sometimes 27:18 students may feel like students of color make may feel like other people look at us 27:23 in the sense of we're here because of affirmative action yes and we've probably all experienced that in any 27:30 space because we're usually the minority and so with those experiences it's all 27:37 sometimes it's hard to kind of get over that kind of think about okay well at the end of the day i'm here 27:42 they can say what they want to but how do you really get to a place where you can just walk into a room you know 27:48 people might be thinking one thing about you but you don't care and you're just gonna do what you need to do how do you

get to that point i think it's hard to not care right we're human we all have

27:59

doubts about ourselves even if people aren't showing it like other people are feeling these things as well so you have

28:05

to remember that in my role i work with a lot of executives and i can tell you they're always nervous

28:11

they feel the same emotions we feel before they speak before they go into a big meeting you see it like kind of the

28:16

shaking the sweating i mean presidents of companies ceos they all go through the same thing they're human so

28:22

you have to first acknowledge you're not alone and i think it helps to sometimes break the ice that way like

28:27

nervous what about you yeah i'm kind of nervous you know so you find a way to connect with people

28:33

the other thing i would say is you know whatever you do that kind of lifts you up whether that's like meditation or

prayer or whatever it is for you it's really important to go into those spaces prepared 28:45

because if you're also like super burned out and like stressed like you break easily 28:51

and like for me i was always like the last thing i want them to see me do is cry you know so i really have to prepare

myself mentally which starts with self-care which is so important with covet and everything we've been through the stress of law students like

lawyers period like you have to take care of yourself so whatever your daily practice is you have to do it and that's

29:09

advice that we can all take we're kind of in a situation where we're figuring out how do i balance

29:15

being a law student but oh wait i still have bills and like 29:20

no money to pay them or like i have things going on with my family so yeah it's it's always a struggle of like how

do i balance all of these things and still be able to do what i need to do totally and so 29:34

with that as you are preparing to transition to your career whether when you were starting looking for summer

29:40

opportunities how did you leverage the notre dame alumni network i think that's 29:45

something that you always hear when you're coming to the school is oh the alumni network the alumni

29:51

network and you're like all right yeah sure but like talk to us about how you really leverage 29:56

that network yeah so for me i'll admit i am not the greatest networker

big surprise like i like the moment like oh i'm having this great conversation i'm terrible about following up and keeping in touch it's not my

it's just not i'll mean to but like i just i move on to the next thing

so i always felt like can i call this person i think i saw them like three months ago and can i call them and i got

the advice from someone was like yes even if they don't remember you just bring them up to speed and make the call

so especially when you're going through those times of making a decision especially a big one that's the time that you really need to make the

decision not alone and with the network so for me it was the decision between going to dayton ohio and taking this other

path and i called um a notre dame alum and i was just it was it was sheila

i'm forgetting i'm looking at bob jones now because i'm like o'brien thank you i'm like i just had a

moment i'm looking i i know her name but she had come to campus she was amazing everybody's like oh you got to

get to know sheila brian she's so connected in chicago you can't go to chicago without knowing sheila brian i'd only had one conversation with her and 31:01

she's like yeah sure call me anytime but i'm here sitting this huge cross sitting at this huge crossroads and like can i call her yes yes the answer is yes like

the notre dame alumni network equals access to that yes pick up the phone i know you don't remember me

31:17

what's going on what's on your heart and she just spoke to me from the heart and she helped she's like girl follow your heart this is easy

31:24

really that's okay i can say no to the law firm she's like yes you know and i needed that so 31:30

um it's so so important to just realize that you are a part of this family don't 31:35

go through all that stuff in your head that we always do i don't have the connections i might i don't know them well enough or i didn't keep in touch

31:41

just use the network or keep in touch that's good too right yeah

31:47

that's also good so i want to get to talking about your early career you're a young attorney you're trying to figure

31:54

out what you want to do you've already thought about what's my calling here you told us how you turned down a

law firm and decided to do government work i want to hear some of the stories there 32:05

because i feel like with that experience you already said you'd be like what is going on what is this so what are the

32:11
