

Judicial clerkships are typically characterized as an unadulterated good—lifelong mentormentee relationships between judges and law clerks that confer professional benefits. But little information exists to help law students identify positive work environments and avoid judges who mistreat their clerks. At the Legal Accountability Project, Aliza Shatzman works to ensure that law clerks have positive clerkship experiences.

Saint of the Week: St. Dismas with Justin Vickers

When Jesus was crucified on Calvary, there were two thieves crucified alongside him. One of the thieves mocked Jesus along with the gathering crowd, saying that if He was truly the Son of God, He would be able to save them. The other thief defended Jesus, saying "Have you no fear of God, for you are subject to the same condemnation? And indeed, we have been condemned justly, for the sentence we received corresponds to our crimes, but this man has done nothing criminal." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus told him, "This day you will be with me in paradise." (Luke 23:43). The thief who spoke up for Jesus was St. Dismas.

There is little else known about St. Dismas other than this specific event. Most of our knowledge of him comes from firsthand accounts of the Crucifixion from the Disciples, along with various legends passed down through the generations. One such legend says that Dismas and his fellow thief held up Joseph and Mary when they were fleeing to Egypt with the child Jesus. Dismas is said to have been moved to compassion and bribed his companion to let the Holy Family pass safely. According to legend, the infant Jesus told Dismas that they would be crucified alongside each other, and that Dismas would accompany Him to Heaven.

The Church never formally canonized St. Dismas, though he is regarded as a saint by virtue of Jesus saying he would be in Paradise, and by local Church traditions. The feast of St. Dismas is venerated on the 25th of March.

St. Dismas serves as the patron of repentant criminals, prisoners, reformed thieves, and those on death row. His story shows that, despite what someone may have done in the



past, it is never too late to change for the better – even when staring in the face of death.
