

In Memoriam: Roger F. Jacobs



Roger F. Jacobs, Professor Emeritus of Law and former long-time Associate Dean and Director of the Kresge Law Library, died on April 17, 2024, in Terre Haute, Indiana at the age of 87. Notre Dame Law School hosted an event for 200 Notre Dame Lawyers, Chicago alumni, and friends on May 22, 2024 at the Chicago Athletic Association. Pete Bevacqua '93, the new Vice President and James E. Rohr Director of Athletics at the University of Notre Dame, was the featured speaker for the evening.

In a fireside conversation, "Navigating the New World of College Athletics," Bevacqua spoke with Marcus Cole. They discussed various topics, including the College Football Playoff, conference affiliations, the future of women's sports, the success of his predecessor Jack Swarbrick '76, and the impact of name, image, and likeness (NIL) rules on recruiting and preserving the studentathlete experience.

Bevacqua also shared insights on how his training as a lawyer has been instrumental in his daily responsibilities and decision-making processes.

Prior to the event, Judge John R. Blakey '88, '92 JD of the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Illinois presented an ethics CLE on "The Ethics of an Unprepared Cross-Examination."



ND Law Global Human Rights Clinic Participates in Landmark Global Climate Change Hearings at the Inter-American Court of Human Rights in Barbados

The Inter-American Court of Human Rights held its 166th Regular Session in Barbados last month, following an invitation from the Government of Barbados. During the session, the Court held a public hearing on "The Climate Emergency and Human Rights," based on an advisory opinion request submitted by the Republics of Colombia and Chile. The Notre Dame Law School Global Human Rights Clinic and the Notre Dame Reparations Design and Compliance Lab submitted an expert brief on this matter in December and participated in the oral arguments. Mary Ellen O'Connell was quoted by the Washington Post about the U.N. court's order that Israel halt its offensive in the southern Gaza city of Rafah in the article, "<u>U.N. court order deepens Israel's isolation as it</u> <u>fights on in Rafah</u>."

She was also quoted extensively by Politico in "<u>Netanyahu case will make or</u> <u>break the ICC</u>" about the decision of the court's Chief Prosecutor Karim Khan to pursue arrest warrants for Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and others.

She was also quoted in The Wall Street Journal, "<u>Prosecuting Netanyahu Has</u> <u>Risks for International Criminal Court</u>" about how the ICC prosecutor's decision could both damage the ICC's prospects with the U.S. and set back the odds of ending the conflict more quickly.
